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1. Summary of the event

ACT Multiplier Event E1 (“Conference”) was held in Barcelona (Residència d’Investigadors) on 6 June 2018, organized by the ACT UAB team. 86 participants took part in the event.

It was disseminated through the project website (<http://pagines.uab.cat/act/content/actunlimited-2-symposium>) and through personal contacts with all relevant stakeholders in the field (email, personal contact, etc.).

To guarantee a wider impact, the ACT multiplier event teamed up with the Unlimited! Conference, whose first edition took place in Antwerp in 2016. This allowed reaching out to a high number of stakeholders interested in live accessible events that had attended the first Unlimited! Symposium.

Additionally, to guarantee an even wider impact, the ACT multiplier event was collocated with two additional conferences organized by TransMedia Catalonia research group at UAB: the UMAQ conference (<http://pagines.uab.cat/umaq/umaq-conference>), which took place the two previous days (4 and 5 June), and the Fun for All Conference (<http://jornades.uab.cat/videogamesaccess/>), which was celebrated the two days after ACT/Unlimited! 2 (7 and 8 June).

The aim of ACT/Unlimited! 2 was to present the results of the ACT project as a whole and, more specifically, IO4 results (i.e. the MOOC). In order to fulfill that aim, a specific ACT panel with a focus on presenting the results of IO4 was organized at the beginning of the day. Participants had the opportunity to see the actual MOOC course developed and provide feedback during a lively discussion. Moreover, a specific discussion session at the end of each additional panel was organized and the chairs (who were all ACT partners) took the opportunity to link the discussion with IO4 results and with the ACT project as a whole.

This document presents the Multiplier Event development, and reports on the feedback received from workshop participants through a satisfaction survey.



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2. Multiplier event development

3. Multiplier event accessibility

In order to increase the accessibility of the multiplier event different measures were taken:

1. Àgils Comunicació acted as an accessibility sponsor and provided live sign language interpreting and also professional live subtitling for the opening session and the ACT panel. The subtitler worked using a QWERTY keyboard in a specific booth, and subtitles were displayed on top of the PPT presentation.
2. All the other sessions were subtitled in English automatically using Webcaptioner (<https://webcaptioner.com/>). The subtitles were shown on top of the screen where the presentation was projected.
3. All speakers were instructed to prepare an accessible presentation and specific guidelines were provided:

4. All presentations were uploaded online prior to the presentation, so that any users needing to magnify or zoom it could easily do it. See links above next to the paper title.

4. Participants

A total of 86 participants took part in the event, from the following countries: Canada, Italy, Germany, Russia, Spain, Poland, UK, Austria, the Netherlands, Belgium, USA, New Zealand, Australia, Switzerland, and Ireland.

23 participants were from UAB, 13 participants were from ACT partner institutions and the rest of participants were external to the ACT consortium.

External participants included participants from universities such as Montreal University, University of Torino, Jagellonian University in Krakow, University of Surrey, UNINT in Rome, UNED, University of Salamanca, University of Murcia, University of Vigo, Auckland University, Colorado State University, University of Granada, Hildesheim University, Texas Tech, Murmansk Arctic State University, Pädagogische Hochschule in Austria or Dublin City University.

There were also relevant stakeholders such as user representatives, free-lancers, service providers and NGOs representatives. A non-exhaustive list includes Viacom Internacional, Rofilms, Komt Het Zien, Hörfilm, ACAPPS, Dostepni.eu, Description Victoria, SUB-TI, ORF Austria, American Council of the Blind, among others.



5. Satisfaction survey

A satisfaction survey was circulated to conference participants by email using the accessible platform Survey Monkey. 33 participants replied it and the following feedback was provided on a 6-point Likert scale in the form of stars.

As seen on Table 1, average value for all indicators are high, all above 5 except for one, which still gets a very high mark (4.73/6). The overall quality is assessed with 5.27/6 and the ACT panel is very well received by participants, who mark it with a 5.06.

Participants also provided additional feedback either on the ACT project or on the multiplier event on a last open text field. Ten replies were collected and are reproduced literally:

- Great and insightful conference with wonderful people and an amazing team regarding support and organisation! I am definitely interested and I hope that I can make it to ACT/Unlimited! 3!
- For me it was a little bit cold in the meeting room.
- I would like to see more dynamics in the presentations, more interaction with the audience. Maybe prepared debat opinions. Green and red cards - a mobile host asking for opinions? I am not a fan of the panel set up. It's a bit stiff.
- The room for the coffee gets very noisy
- It was wonderful – thank you all!
- The fruit, fruit juices and sandwiches were lovely!
- Great organisation. Good contents.
- Some of the presentations were not accessible enough.
- I've learned a lot and I have enjoyed it a lot. It's been a great conference!
- Excellent conference, great presenters and overall great experience



6. Conclusions

Overall, the aim of the workshop, which was to present the results of the project with an emphasis on IO4 results, was fulfilled, and the assessments obtained through an online survey show a high satisfaction by participants.

It should be stressed that the multiplier event gathered a high number of interested stakeholders which took the opportunity to engage in a lively discussion on the ACT project in particular and in accessibility in live events as a whole. Many participants showed interest in enrolling in the MOOC that has been produced as part of the ACT project.

As suggested in the application, the multiplier event had a multisectorial approach and four sectors were tackled: academia, scenic arts, cultural policies, and quality certification. Relevant issues related to social integration, user interaction, technologies, inclusion policies, to name just a few, were discussed during the one-day event.

Sustainability of this event has been guaranteed and the next Unlimited! Conference was announced during the closing remarks for 2020. It will be celebrated in Antwerp (Belgium).
