Ideology and language

The lens through which we see the world



Linguistic choices: language is not neutral



Research question

Can we be objective when we face...

- Sensitive content?
- Ideological content?

Does describers' ideology influence AD strategies?



Ideology in Translation

 Ideology does influence translation strategies

(Naranjo, 2022; Meseguer, Rojo & Oliveira, in press)

- Strategies (Meseguer, 2015, 2018, 2022)
 - Self-censorship: omissions, attenuations
 - Re-writing: additions, inadequacies



Methodology

- 109 participants:
 - Last year translation students
 - Trained in AVT and AD
- Procedure: online form
- 14 images depicting diversity and minorities:
 - Disability
 - Sexual diversity and gender pluralism
 - Sexual violence
 - Ethnicity
- 2 min./image



Ideology questionnaire

- To allocate participants in the ideological spectrum
- 20 items
 - Sexual/gender diversity
 - Political ideas
 - Religion



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- Not valid: 95 % left-wing (too homogeneous)

Data & results

Objectivity vs. sensitive content

- Ask protagonists? (Royal Holloway University; Thompson & Hutchinson, 2021)
- VIP's right to know?
- Visibility?



Normativity and defaults

Defaults: what we assume a person looks like if we have no information about them (Royal Holloway: Thompson & Hutchinson, 2021; VocalEyes, 2020)

- 'Robert is a non-disabled, white, cis-gendered man.'
- 'Claire is a non-disabled, white, non-binary character'



Some suggestions

- Importance of CONTEXT
- Treated INDIVIDUALLY
- Integrated access (Fryer, 2018;
 Fryer & Cavallo, 2022): subjective,
 involving creators from the start.



Limitations and future research

- Exploratory study
- Students vs. professionals
- Different cultural/linguistic/religious backgrounds
- Process study:
 - Where do describers fix their attention?
 - Challenges when describing diversity?
- Reception study on mental images: what do participants imagine?



More questions than answers

- VIP's right to know vs. sensitive content?
- Sensitive language in cases of time constraints?
- Should diversity be openly addressed in all cases?
- Should we describe defaults?





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
