




RTV Slovenija is a national public service media organization committed to accessibility for all audiences.

- News in easy-to-understand language


Easy-to-understand (E2U) news?




Easy-to-understand language is "any language variety which enhances comprehensibility." (ISO/IEC 23859:2023)

- Easy Language is the most simplified variety addressed to persons with reading comprehension difficulties.
- Plain Language is a modality addressed to non-specialised standard readers which makes sure that the wording, structure and design are so clear that the intended readers "can easily find what they need, understand what they find, and use that information".

Current services in E2U at RTV SLO






News portal in easy-to-understand language

- Launched in 2020 as a weekly service
- Expanded to daily service in 2021
- One-third of content focuses on Slovenian current affairs
- Includes coverage of elections and referendums
- Recipes, trivia like important Slovene people, and travel tips for Slovenia


Behind the scenes (E2U at RTVSLO)



- Producing pilots in different AV formats;
- Developing work processes for different audio and video formats.
- Gathering feedback from target groups to ensure clarity and understandability.



Research and testing with users at RTV SLO (ongoing)






What have we learned so far?

- Not the same rules as for easy-to-understand text
- Speech slightly slower, but not too slow
- Stable rhythm & trained voice talent matters
- Simple words, short sentences
- One topic at a time, clear structure with division
- Visuals and short on-screen text support key points
- Explain only what's essential; some found textual
 E2U explanations in AV format laughable


ENACT Project (2024–2026)

- Brings together experts from multiple EU countries
- Surveys what's been done already and identifies
 the most effective methods for producing news in E2U
- Develops guidelines for accessible news in audiovisual media
 and creates an online hub with examples for general public and experts
